Centric offers a community research approach, incorporating academic literature reviews, ethnographic research, primary interview data and focus groups to uncover nuances which are often below the radar and deciphers sentiments within the urban locale. For this reason, there is a significance of bringing communities into the discussion, as we have seen in our previous research into COVID-19 and medical scepticism. There has to be equitable collaboration, away from tokenism, towards working with communities with strategic direction in mind.

The success extends beyond Centric through philanthropic efforts like <u>CenGiving</u>, which now empowers communities globally, spanning regions such Ghana, Gambia, the Dominican as Republic, and more. CenGiving continues its mission by globally building local community capacity, conducting research, and initiating projects that address the pressing issues affecting their daily lives and the future of their communities.

Centric's community research approach is unique in that our model involves upskilling people from local communities to engage in research in their own communities. Our approach emphasises including groups and sections of the communities who do not usually come forward in such processes, to tap into their unheard voices and perspectives and therefore upholds an equitable research ethos which fosters a collaborative co-learning environment. Centric engages in continuous reflective practice based on our own challenges which has encouraged us to adapt our approach as necessary and take on board new learning. This has been important as a team which sits between both communities and institutions.
