utilitarianism versus deontology



In Kant's deontology, the rightness of an interaction depends upon treating a person as an end in himself/ herself rather than a means to some consequence. Kant comes to this position by maintaining, as did the Greeks, that humans are rational animals and that their rationality entitles them to the right to be treated as beings of absolute worth and dignity in themselves. ... in dealing with another rational being one ought to take into consideration the other's absolute worth as an individual self. If, contrary to this, we treat him/her as a means merely, even as a means to good consequences, then we use him/her only for some purpose, thus violating his/her right to be treated as an end.
