ARC Maternity and Perinatal Mental Health Research

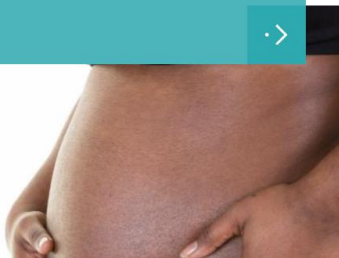
- **Current issues in SE London:** poorer outcomes for women & babies living in areas of social disadvantage, with mental health difficulties or from Black, Asian & minority ethnic groups
 - What are the reasons for this?
 - What models of care can help?
 - How has the COVID-19 pandemic affected these health inequalities?
- We aim to reduce health inequities & have a positive impact on health & wellbeing of women & families in the local community
- Involve women, communities and relevant organisations in our strategy from the beginning of our work

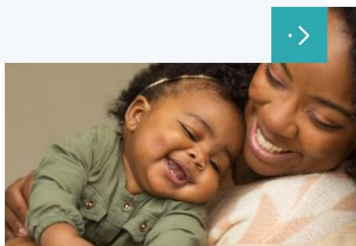

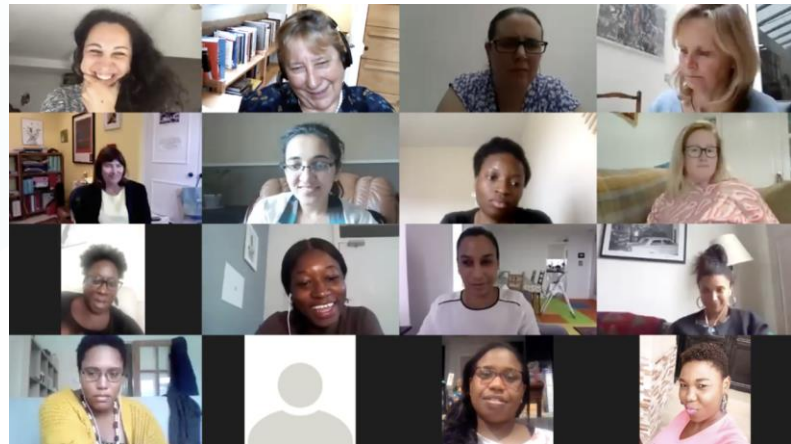
PPIE - Patient & Public Involvement & Engagement

How we can all play a role in bringing about change

Questions for introspection

- **Are our leadership teams reflective of the types of audiences we are trying to reach?**
- **What Black researchers are we working with on this project?**
- **What Black networks are we reaching out to and co-producing with?**
- **Are we funding our partners adequately?**
- **Is our approach transactional or relationship led?**
- **How are we collaborating with and amplifying the voices of those who are already doing the grassroots work within the community?**

Participatory appraisal methodology

Key questions

- How can researchers work with diverse communities?
- How can we share power?
- How can we overcome barriers to PPIE within research systems and culture?



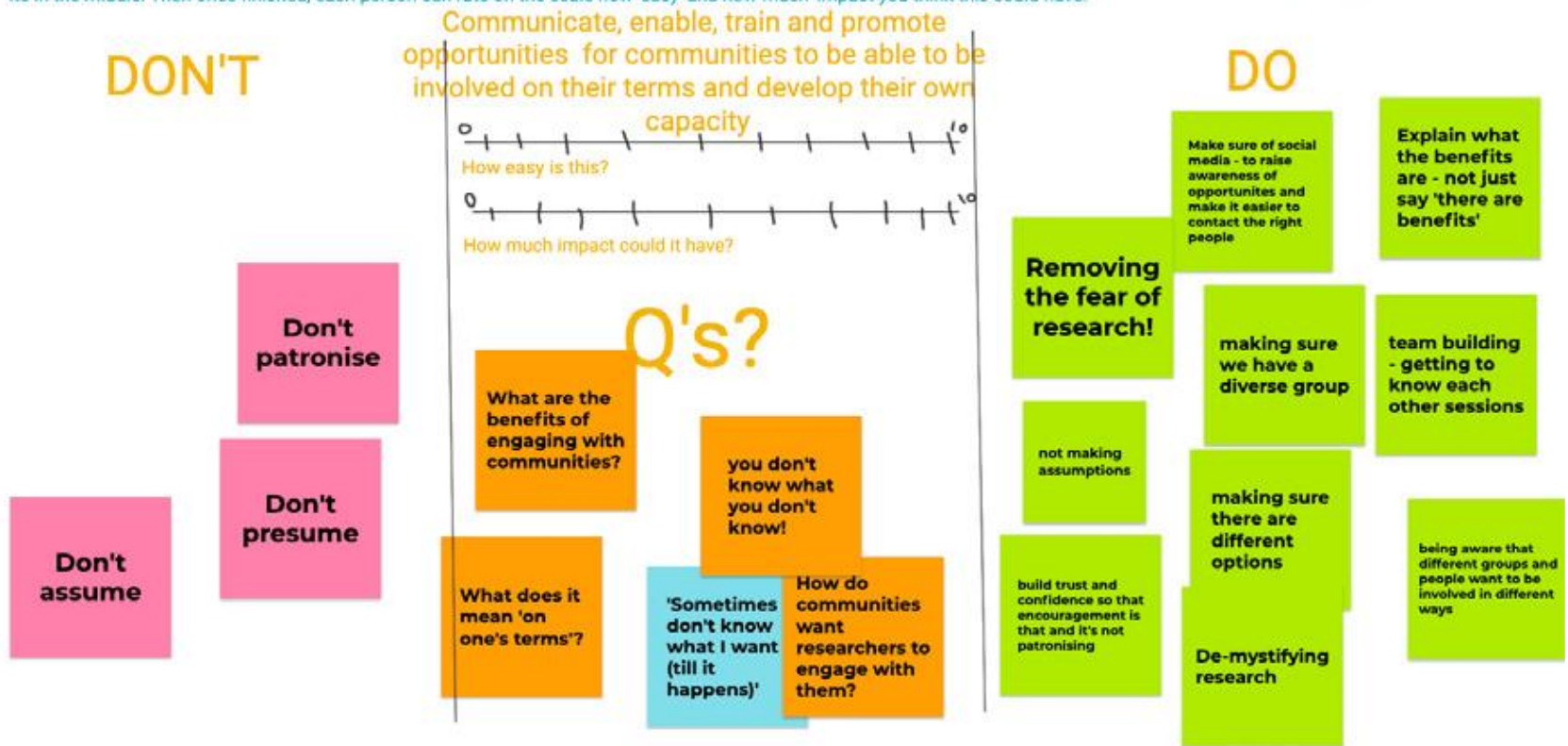
Spider diagram – an illustration of barriers and potential solutions



The H form

How can we implement these solutions?

H-Form: Discuss this solution... write what we could 'do' in green post-its on the right, and 'don't's' in pink on the left. If you have any questions write them in yellow post-its in the middle. Then once finished, each person can rate on the scale how 'easy' and how much 'impact' you think this could have.



Themes – Dos (and don'ts)

- **Community-focus**
- **Communications**
- **Funding**
- **Trust**
- **Power imbalance**
- **Diversity**



“We need to prioritise research questions which are important to local communities... not just driven by funding bodies”
(workshop participant)

Recommended actions:

- Ask the community: “What is important?”
- Budget for a PPIE lead
- Think reciprocity
- Advocate for community-led research

‘Technical or formal language being used, which works for ethical approval and might score highly for ‘respectful’ can seem distant and cold and therefore either nothing to do with me, or positively alienating**’**

(workshop participant)

Recommended actions:

- Ensure information is short and clear
- Get community advice on communications
- Plan outreach activities carefully
- Ask which social media platforms are best

“ Money and funding came up... not having the money to do things properly, not having the resources... wanting to do things better, but not being able to do it. **”**
(plenary discussion)

Recommended actions:

- Plan PPIE funding in detail
- Apply for adequate funding
- Be clear about all work that needs funding
- Budget for team building and training



“We also spoke about trust being very, very important, and providing information and representation at all levels of decision making, as well as adequate funding**”**
(plenary discussion)

Recommended actions:

- Be respectful and appreciative
- Work together with reciprocal benefits
- Build trust with key community influencers
- Support active development of research by community members
- Ask: “Are we sharing power? What can we do differently?”
